#### **Elementary School:**



Our middle and high school students gave out candy to our elementary school students so they could experience a safe trick or treat while displaying their amazing costumes. The best part was watching our elementary staff form a word wall with their created costumes. #### Middle School:

#### In the CCB Classrooms:

Throughout the fall, Copper Canyon CCB focused on community experiences aimed at helping students prepare for the transition into life after High School. Students participated in 3 field trips designed around introducing the students to new careers and life on a college campus. The first outing was to Twisted Manez Beauty Salon where the students learned about Cosmetology, Nail Technology, Barbering, and Salon Management. The second trip was to Estrella Mountain Community College. Students who participated got to explore the campus and ask questions about the differences between college and high school. The last outing was to the 2017 Arizona Construction Career Days. Students who participate in this event had hands-on experiences in many different construction-related occupations. All three trips allowed the students opportunities to network with community members who are looking to mentor and employ young talent from diverse backgrounds.

#### **Pendergast Program:**

Our fun event this month was making slime for science. We experimented with how to make the slime have different textures (rubbery vs sticky) and we experimented with the best ways to make different colors. We included the K-3 classroom and I allowed my students to teach the younger kids the correct measurements to get the "best" slime.

#### **Occupational Therapy Corner**

Is your child a picky eater? Recent studies have demonstrated that nutrition affects "thinking skills," behavior and health, all factors that impact academic performance. Nutritional deficiencies can also affect cognitive development.



Occupational Therapy tips to assist with eating new foods:

- Create a mealtime schedule and do not allow children to graze throughout the day
- For all snacks and meals offer 1 protein, 1 fruit, 1 vegetable and 1 whole grain
- Create a nurturing safe environment to explore new foods (never force a child to taste new foods, let him make the decision)
- Allow the child to spit out foods if he does not like it, have a "no thank you" plate next to him when tasting new foods
- Make meals and snacks with your child
- Try playing with food first, paint with vegetables, stack celery or practice math problems or handwriting in yogurt
- If your child eats less than 20 foods, please consult with your doctor to ensure proper nutrition for brain growth and development
